Lancaster Canal (Lancaster to

There are attractive views from the canal over Morecambe Bay to the Lakeland Hills and canal side villages to stop at on the way. n the city centre the canal takes you past nistoric mills, a cathedral and water side pubs. City Centre Loop

There are signed cycle routes through the university and covered cycle parking.

Lune Aqueduct

The outstanding feature of the Lancaster Canal. Ride across the Lune Aqueduct, one of the seven wonders of the canal age. The Aqueduct cost £48,000 to build in 1803. There is now a cycle ramp from the Lune Aqueduct to the riverside cycle path below.



Cycling to Lancaster Railway Station

here is a direct cycle path from the Millennium Bridge to the railway station and a linking cycle path to the south. You will find cycle parking on Platforms 3 and 5. Combining cycling with train journeys is a great way of avoiding the stress of motorway

Celebrating Lancaster's maritime past, the park links the Lune Valley with the estuary. From the Millennium Bridge, there are the following cycle paths: **Lancaster-Crook O'Lune & Caton** 6 miles

Cycle upstream past the Lune Aqueduct to the Crook O'Lune, a viewpoint out over the Lune Valley, Caton and Bull Beck. **Lancaster to Glasson Dock** 5 miles

Cycle down the Lune Estuary, passing the Maritime Museum and St George's Quay to Glasson a 18th century dock.

Lancaster to Snatchems 2 miles Ride along the north side of the estuary to Snatchems with its historic pub. You can continue on minor roads to Sunderland an historic quayside village at the

mouth of the Lune. Watch the tides as the village gets cut off at high tide.
